Best Nursing Practices for Faith Integration

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Purpose of the Session

- Jesus came to serve others as He touched the untouchable and marginalized.
- Nurses, and other members of the healthcare team, can use their gifts and talents they have been given, as well as their training, to come alongside the vulnerable, hurting, suffering, and broken in the same way Jesus did.

- Care for not only the body of the sick and dying, but the mind and spirit as well.

Caring and Listening

- Stories are a basic component of the human experience used around the world.
- "If you listen to me properly, I feel good"
- Listening to the factors that influence choices help guide caring patient care.
- When we don't listen to a patient's story, we miss important details.
- Patient outcomes improve when they feel cared for and valued.
- Patient satisfaction scores improve when they feel we have listened.

- To be able to help people wholistically, we need to understand God's plan, where sin and suffering fit in, and recognize the work and ministry of Jesus.


Shalom




"Shalom means just relationships and enjoyable relationships.

Love Your Neighbor as Yourself: Luke 10:30-37




- Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead.
- A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side.
- So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side.
- But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him.

He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, took him to an inn and took care of him.

The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

"Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"

The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."



Go And Do Likewise

- When a lawyer asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus answers with the Good Samaritan parable, a story of caring, compassion, mercy, hospitality, and love.
- He then tells the lawyer "Go and do likewise." He wants us to be caught up in His work going on all around us.
